PASTOR'S DISCRETIONARY FUND: WHAT IT IS AND HOW IT WORKS

On the Sunday in December when I went with our youth to Walmart to shop for presents using money from the Rich Huff Fund, I set off to purchase items for gift bags (funded by Social Ministry) to give to residents of Country Comfort retirement home. I told the cashier what we were doing with all those bottles of shampoo, lotion, and hand soap, and she was impressed by the thoughtfulness of our congregation. "I wish I had known about your church. I'm having trouble paying my rent this month," she mentioned. She told me that even though she works full time, her income does not always stretch enough when extra medical bills or other expenses come due. I told her that we have a Pastor's Discretionary Fund at our church and that we could help her with her rent. She paused from bagging my items and her eyes lit up with gratitude. "Really? That would be such a huge help!"


I have heard that phrase many times as a pastor when I say: "Yes, we can help." Just in the last year, we have helped a family fix their furnace so they could have heat this winter; gave food and gas cards to families who needed just a boost to help them over the hump (including members and non-members), and helped to pay an individual's electric bill when he had fallen on hard times. Because of the generosity of our members, when individuals contact our church with needs, we are able to assist them through this fund, fulfilling Jesus' command to care for "the least of these."

But some have come to me with questions about how we make sure the church isn't "taken for a ride," or scammed by people just looking for a hand-out without any real need. It's important to know that there are safeguards we put in place whenever anyone comes to us asking for assistance from the Pastor's Discretionary Fund.

- 1. We fill out a form for each person that notes all their information, what their need is and the circumstances of their situation. We make suggestions for other ways they can find help, such as Women in Transition, public assistance, and other service agencies. We keep the form in a confidential file.
- 2. We never give funds directly to the person. If they are asking for help with rent or a utility bill, we make arrangements for the payment to go directly to the accounts payable office. If they are asking for money for food or gas, we purchase gift cards to give to the individual.
- 3. We limit the total amount we give at one time to no more than \$50 \$100, depending on the need and the amount that is in the discretionary account at that time.
- 4. We limit the number of times a person can receive help from the church to no more than once every six months, and no more than three times in a two-year period.

Sadly, there have been times in my ministry at previous churches when I have been "scammed" by people seeking assistance. This is unfortunate because there are so many people with legitimate needs who could use our help. These safeguards help to ensure that there is enough money to give at least some assistance to those who come to us with needs, without depleting the funds, and with protections in place.




Martin Luther and Martin Luther King, Jr. Sharing more than just a name!

Many people confuse the man who started the Protestant Reformation with the man who led the Civil Rights movement in America. As our

country celebrates Black History month, our Confirmation students learned about why the connection between the two men goes beyond just their names. Here are some of their reflections:

There are many similarities between the 16th century

reformer, Martin Luther, and the 1960s civil rights activist, Martin Luther King Jr. One similarity is that both of them fought against what they thought was wrong. Martin Luther fought against the Roman Catholic Church because they were lying to the people. Martin Luther



King Jr. fought for racial equality through nonviolence and words, just like how Martin Luther fought. Another similarity between the two men is that they both made lasting marks on the world. Martin Luther started a whole new branch of Christianity and Martin Luther King Jr. influenced the change for racial equality. Their incredible works to change the way things were are still remembered today. — **Amy Danowsky**

Martin Luther and Martin Luther King Jr. share many similarities. They were both Protestants, even though it was seen as a negative term in Luther's time. They both stood up for what they thought was right to make the world a better place. They wanted to reform what people thought they knew about the Bible. King stood up for rights for blacks stating everyone is equal before God and that is how it should be all around the world. Luther also stated that God is forgiving to all sins and loves everyone equally. I think it is appropriate that King was named after Luther because he created a huge movement in

the world and inspired many people, including teens, today. They are both very important historical figures that will forever be remembered.

Both King and Luther left an enormous influence on me and inspired me as well. King taught me to never judge a book by the cover. No matter what some one looks like, we are all the same inside, and you would be shocked to find out how much you could have in common with someone you would never expect. 

HEALTH TID-BITS

From our Parish Nurses

The holidays are over, winter is here, and we are into a new year. Let's talk about New Year's Resolutions.

Do your kids resist trying new, healthy foods? Jennifer Lee wanted to find a way to take the stress out of feeding her kids healthy foods. She developed a program called *The 52 New Foods Challenge*, www.52NEWFOODS.com. Lee challenged her kids to try a new unfamiliar food each week. Along with trying the foods, the children helped shop and prepare it. Before long even her very picky daughter was not rebelling against the new foods.

Here are a few tips for budgeting your meals. Before planning a meal, check your refrigerator for any leftovers that can be "recycled" into another meal. If a recipe calls for an expensive ingredient (like sun-dried tomatoes), use it sparingly. After a meal, put leftovers in meal size portions and freeze them for another time. Don't put them in the refrigerator and forget about them, where they will spoil and you will end up throwing them away. Remember that eating out costs more than eating in, as well as not being as healthy. We consume an extra 200 calories when eating out versus eating at



home. I'm not saying we should never eat out, but instead limit the number of times we do, and choose places that have healthier options on their menus.

I can't talk about healthy eating without mentioning exercise. Exercise can be done at home or in a gym, by yourself or with family and friends. It's a great way to spend time together as a family. Find something that inter-

ests you, that you are able to do. If you start doing exercises that you hate, you are not going to stick with it.

Another great New Year Resolution is doing more *good deeds*. Get involved in doing things for others. Do you need some ideas? How about volunteering at a nursing home, library, hospital, or at church. Many of these places you can volunteer together as a family, another great way to spend time together. And what a great feeling it is when we help others.

These are just a few resolutions ideas. I'm sure we all have others we have made, but the important thing is to try to find a resolution that you will continue doing and that will make you feel better about yourself.
