

FROM THE PASTOR



When the sabbath was over, Mary Magdalene, and Mary the mother of James, and Salome bought spices, so that they might go and anoint him. And very early on the first day of the week, when the sun had risen, they went to the tomb. They had been saying to one another, "Who will roll away the stone for us from the entrance to the tomb?" When they looked up, they saw that the stone, which was very large, had already been rolled back. As they entered the tomb, they saw a young man, dressed in a white robe, sitting on the right side; and they were alarmed. But he said to them, "Do not be alarmed; you are looking for Jesus of Nazareth, who was crucified. He has been raised; he is not here. Look, there is the place they laid him. But go, tell his disciples and Peter that he is going ahead of you to Galilee; there you will see him, just as he told you." So they went out and fled from the tomb, for terror and amazement had seized them; and they said nothing to anyone, for they were afraid.

Mark 16:1-8

Alleluia! Christ is risen! Christ is risen indeed! Alleluia! Dear, United In Christ,

Have you ever had the experience where you set out to accomplish one thing, but end up being totally blindsided by something you never expected? It's a disorienting experience and, more often than not, tends to leave me thinking "did that really just happen?" I've got to figure that this was pretty darn close to the question that came to the minds of Mary and Mary as they left the empty tomb that resurrection morning.

After all, they came to the tomb expecting to accomplish one given task, but what they encountered there was so out of the ordinary that they are left in total amazement.

So totally amazed and bewildered were they, in fact, that they end up keeping the news to themselves! Despite the words from the white-robed young man, Mary and Mary flee from the tomb saying nothing about what they found there. Their experience of the resurrection catches them so off guard that they're not even sure it really happened! Yet, according to the earliest manuscripts we have, this is the exact moment that Mark chooses to end his telling of "the good news of Jesus Christ, the Son of God" (Mark 1:1). Here, there is no eloquent Jesus waiting to be met in order to offer a discourse on this new resurrected life. Here we just have two of those who loved the Jesus they knew walking away in profound confusion as we watch on as readers.

See, this is the brilliance of Mark's gospel, though. As readers of the story, we hear the words of the young man to go and tell the others about the risen Jesus, but are blindsided by the silence of those who met him. Mark turns the task to us! By ending his narrative here, Mark turns the agency to us as readers. Now it is our turn to go out and tell this good news that we have seen and heard! I hope that, in this Easter season, you may take Mark's lead to find and share the signs of new life that surround us. Know that, whether confused and befuddled or not, the risen Christ does go before us.

All are welcome! No prior experience required! Come and see!


View from the Pew By Sharon Weiser

We have the most awesome kiddos at UIC. They hurry to go up with Pastor Justin on Sunday mornings when he invites them to come for children's sermon and they answer the questions he asks. But when he is finished sharing the day's thoughts with them and is ready to pray with them and says "We need to do two things..." immediately there is one little girl whose enthusiasm erupts! I think all of us wait for this to happen. Sometimes "Prayers and lollipops" comes out even before he begins to say "there are two things!"

We should all have this kind of enthusiasm, all be filled with the excitement and joy that hearing and learning about our God and Saviour brings us. We've been going through the season of Lent, a time of solemnity and reflection. It's also a time when Alleluia is taken out of the liturgy, as this is a joyful expression. On April 1st we will leave that time and once again focus on the joyful fact that Christ, who died on the cross as a sacrifice for us - to save us from our sins, is once again alive! Let's let ourselves be like enthusiastic children, full of joy and gladness.

Alleluia, Christ is risen! Shout it loud, shout it enthusiastically! Shout it because it excites you and you want to share it with everyone and in doing so you might touch the ears and heart of someone who doesn't know how wonderful this is. And shout it daily because we ARE Easter people, we believe that Christ IS alive and we have the promise that because He lives, we will live eternally! **ALLELUIA!**

An Easter message from Presiding Bishop Elizabeth Eaton



It all started with such promise – the angel announcing to Mary that the child she would bear would be called Son of the Most High; the conviction of Mary that this child would be the embodiment of God's promised justice, that the hungry would be filled with good things and the rich sent away empty; angels announcing his birth; thousands being fed; the sick healed; the dead raised.

And then, "My God, my God, why have you forsaken me?" It was over. The world hadn't changed. Might still made right. How ridiculously naïve to believe that any reversal of the old order could come about. Hope is for the gullible. Looking at this broken man hanging utterly helpless, naked and broken on a cross, the powers and principalities, earthly and spiritual, death and the devil must have said, "You fool."

This, as St. Paul reminds us, is the wisdom of the world. And

the world can present plenty of hard evidence that it is right: children killing children in horrific school shootings, 60 million displaced people – all of this supported by our rebellion against God, our idolatrous claim that we are in control and the world is ours. In the face of this and all of the suffering others cause and we cause others, we, too, might cry out, "My God, my God, why have you forsaken me?"

I believe that the beginning of Psalm 22 expresses the anguish of the psalmist and the anguish of our Lord, but there is more going on here. Citing the first words of a text was, in the tradition of the time, a way of identifying an entire passage. The psalm ends this way: "All the ends of the earth shall remember and turn to the Lord; and all the families of the nations shall worship before him. ... Posterity will serve him; future generations will be told about the Lord, and proclaim his deliverance to a people yet unborn, saying that he has done it." This is the wisdom of God. Jesus' crucifixion is the death of our death. His innocent suffering has reconciled all of creation to God. He has done it. We stake our lives on this.

This year, Easter falls on April 1. We shall have come through the Lenten desert to the Easter garden. We shall say, "Christ is risen. He is risen indeed. Alleluia!" And we shall confess this and live this in the face of worldly wisdom that is based on death. Life wins. Love wins. And if the world wants to call us April fools, we are glad to claim that title.

- Money raised for youth camp scholarships and youth gathering: \$2,243!!



COMMUNITY AID BIN

We've partnered with CommunityAid, which is a local, faith based non-profit organization that operates thrift stores, the closest being in Selinsgrove.

CommunityAid gives back to the community by giving their partners \$.04 per pound of clothing/shoes collected from their bins. A full bin of clothing = 800 lbs of clothing, or \$32.

Partners are also eligible to apply for grants after 1 year of partnership. Additionally, CommunityAid will provide shopping vouchers for UIC to give to those in need.



Money generated by the bin will be used to continue OAKs Senior Center at UIC. After one year, OAKs can also apply for a grant through CommunityAid, which will be used to keep the Senior Center running.

The collection bin can be found at the north side of

the parking lot. Please help support us by dropping off any clothing or shoes you don't want anymore. You can also donate other items, but the church will not receive money for those items.


