Surely, from now on all generations will call me blessed; for the Mighty One has done great things for me, and holy is his name. His mercy is for those who fear him from generation to generation. He has shown strength with his arm; he has scattered the proud in the thoughts of their hearts. He has brought down the powerful from their thrones, and lifted up the lowly; he has filled the hungry with good things, and sent the rich away empty. He has helped his servant Israel, in remembrance of his mercy, according to the promise he made to our ancestors, to Abraham and to his descendants forever."

Luke 1:46-55

Dear United In Christ,

What are you expecting to find in the manger?

It's easy, I think, to get caught up in our own anticipations. In fact, I think it's completely natural to do so! As we move into the season of Advent this month, we begin a season of preparation, a season where it is easy to let our anticipations and our expectations build. We put up our trees, we light the candles around the wreath, we set out the Nativity set all while we wait for the baby to arrive in the manger. As the tension continues to build in the waiting of this season, it necessarily begs the question: what are *you* expecting?

I think a lot of us, myself included, expect all those feel-good moments that seem to come with the season. We expect the joy to the world that comes with the greeting of this newborn Savior. We expect the jubilation that comes with the announcement from the angels we have heard on high. We might even expect to catch moments of peace that come out of such a silent night. Whatever our expectations may be, for as varied and diverse as they are, it seems that we've got a lot riding on what is tucked in there so far away in a manger.

Now, to be fair, Mary also had her own great expectations about the child she carried. What's more is that, like so many great and gifted people throughout the centuries, she put those expectations to song. Here, in the Magnificat, Mary exclaims her hopes and dreams for her child, the same hopes and joys found in God her Savior. Looking over her words, though, we'd be hard pressed to find the images of tranquil serenity we often imagine. Instead, the expectations that burst forth from Mary seem so – *disruptive*. As the proud are scattered in the thoughts of their hearts, as the powerful are brought down from their thrones, and as the rich are sent away empty, we hear expectations of a rather unsettling nature. Mary, it seems, expects things to soon be shaken up!

But you know, I think Mary's expectations might just be the reminder we need as we head into these upcoming seasons of preparation and celebration in Advent and at Christmas. I think there is a real temptation to believe that this season is only about embracing as many warm and fuzzy feelings as we can. Our Hallmark sensibilities make us think that this is a time to spoil one another and bask in a dream-like joy of company with each other. Believe me, these are

things that I cherish in this season just as much as the next person, but Mary's expectant reminder is that this world, in all of its anticipation, is soon to be shaken up like a snow globe plucked from the shelf. Her song makes clear that soon and very soon, things are going to change.



Her song reminds us that when God steps into this world, nothing

can stay the same. As Mary proclaims the one who chooses to reach out with a strong arm to lift up the lowly and fill the hungry with good things in the remembrance of mercy, she paints a picture of a world turned upside down and reordered. It may be disconcerting to consider a God who would bring such upheaval, but maybe the God who steps into humanity by becoming a baby *should* make us feel a little uncomfortable in this season. After all, the one who is heralded by angels and who makes a divine entry in the vulnerable space of a feeding trough makes it clear that our normal expectations of strength and power are *not* where God decides to dwell. Instead, God chooses to inhabit the weakness and frailty of this human existence. In stepping into the brokenness of this world, God in Christ Jesus comes to take on and upend all notions of power and might. It may be completely unexpected, but it is most assuredly good news!

See, all of this reordering, all of this discomfort, all of Mary's expectations of reversal, it's all done *for you*. The infant Jesus for whom we expectantly wait *is* the Jesus who comes for you. By stepping into this world, God reorders the whole landscape so that God may draw you close. No longer will the conventional "powers that be" keep you from the love that God bears for you. No longer will the ordering and values of the world dictate *your* value in this world. Instead, the God who casts down the mighty to lift the lowly does so in order that you might always know your place with the God who remembers God's mercy and promises for all people. There's joy, you see, in the disturbance coming to greet us. Whether expected or not, the proclamation of this season is that to *you* is born the child who will upend this world to greet you.

So, United In Christ, have a wonderfully merry Christmas. I hope you get a little shaken up.

2019 OFFERING ENVELOPES

Starting Sunday, December 9, if you have a church mailbox, you'll find your 2019

NEW FELLOWSHIP HALL FLOORING

At our Nov. Congregational Meeting we voted to move forward with a recommended proposal to replace the carpeting in the fellowship hall with sectional floating laminate flooring. This new flooring would come in multiple pieces that interlock together, but can be replaced in sections should a portion get ruined at any point.

After receiving multiple quotes from three separate companies, we voted to pursue a quote of **\$15,000** (materials and labor) from Oberdorf's that involved a heavily discounted rate on the flooring material itself. To obtain this rate, however, we must be able to make a deposit of \$3,994 (50% of material cost) by the end of the year with the remaining material balance of \$3,994 paid by the end of January 2019. While our Congregational Council has been setting funds aside monthly into a Capital Expense Fund to take on improvements like this, we could definitely use some extra help in tackling this project! Starting this month, we will be setting out pink special envelopes which can be used to contribute to this project beyond our regular Sunday Offering.

As you feel called and are able, you are invited to simply place your cash or check in the envelope with your name and write "Fellowship Hall Floor" on it. In the days ahead, we will be putting a display up to help us track our progress for the project. If you have any questions about the project along the way, please feel free to touch base with any member of the Property Committee or Congregational Council! We look forward to seeing the fruits of our labor as our space gets a bit of a face lift and is equipped with sustainable materials to last for a long time into the church's future!



AED TRAINING

If someone in church suddenly collapsed, would you know what to do?

If you would like to learn how to use UIC's AED machine, go to the church library immediately following worship on Sunday, December 2. Jen Sheaffer will hold a training class to teach you how to use the machine and she'll be able to answer any questions you may have.

You Have the Power to Restart a Heart. We Can Show You How.



Sudden cardiac arrest is a leading cause of death among adults over the age of 40 – and it's a "healthcare crisis," affecting more than 300,000 people every year, according to the Sudden Cardiac Arrest Foundation.

Even the fastest paramedics could take 8-12 minutes to get to a patient after he or she collapses. Quick access to an automatic external defibrillator, or AED, could increase the odds of survival from about 5% to 40% and higher!

What is a Defibrillator (AED)?

A defibrillator is a small, lightweight device that allows quick-thinking citizens and co-workers to treat sudden cardiac arrest by delivering a shock to the victim's chest, ideally re-starting his or her heart. There is no danger of harming a patient who might not need defibrillation because an AED diagnoses dangerous heart rhythms and responds accordingly. AEDs are user friendly and even "talk" the user through the process.
