FROM THE PASTOR



[Jesus said:] "I still have many things to say to you, but you cannot bear them now. When the Spirit of truth comes, he will guide you into all truth; for he will not speak on his own, but will speak whatever he hears, and he will declare to you the things that are to come. He will glorify me, because he will take what is mine and declare it to you. All that the Father has is mine. For this reason I said that he will take what is mine and declare it to you."

John 16:12-15

Dear United In Christ,

I once heard someone much smarter than me say the last page of the Bible should really end in a set of ellipses rather than a simple period. Grammatically, these ellipses (you know, the . . . that sometimes appears in the midst of text) create the space for writers to acknowledge parts that are missing. They are used to skip over sections of quotations in order to save the precious real estate of academia to get to the substance of a selection. However, they inherently imply that there is something missing, something that did not get included. The implication, then, that the last book of the Bible really ought to end in ellipses was that this accounting of God and God's relationship with God's people, this recording of the good news of God incarnate in Jesus Christ of Nazareth – it's not yet complete. There's yet more that is missing; God hasn't stopped moving.

I appreciate this image for many reasons, but mostly because at its heart, it's incredibly humbling. It's humbling because it reminds me that no matter how greatly I try to conceive of God, no matter what schema I use to try to reconcile God's movements, God is always bigger. Take the Bible itself, for instance. In the above passage from John's Gospel, Jesus lays out that there is yet more still to reveal to his disciples. There is still more to be said. Yet, rather than simply say it then and there, he places his

own ellipses among his words. “I still have many things to say to you . . . When the Spirit of truth comes, he will guide you into all truth.” Even in the bounds of the text, Jesus acknowledges that there is more work ahead, the work of the Spirit beyond his ministry. In much the same way, the gospel writer also acknowledges the limitations of their medium: “Now Jesus did many other signs in the presence of his disciples, which are not written in this book” (John 20:30). In short, the pages of the text are not nearly enough to completely capture the movements of God in the world!

Now, here’s why such reconciling of the ellipses is important. All too often it seems that many of our fellow Christians have stopped listening to God beyond the letters of the pages. In more ways than one, much of Christian culture has worked to constrain God’s movement to only what can be found in the pages of the Bible. In effect, their actions and words have taken the Bible, the medium of coming to understand God and fall into faith, and erroneously elevated it to the object of faith and devotion. They’ve placed the Bible on God’s level and created the ironic movement of bibliolatry; they’ve turned the Bible into a golden calf, into its own idol! See, we need these words from Jesus and John, we need these ellipses to help us keep that very first commandment and remind us that, in the end . . . God > the Bible.

We need a God who is bigger than the pages we can write down. We need a God who continues to move about the world beyond the last page of Revelation. We also need the tools to help us to discern those movements. See, just because God > the Bible doesn’t mean we should throw the Bible away. In the words of those very pages, we become attuned to the ways in which God has maintained God’s covenant of love and life for God’s people – for you – and can see it at work around us. God’s Spirit continues to move in new ways around us: through the community of UIC, through the work of Synods and Churchwide Assemblies, through reformers and theologians across the ages and of our own time, through more ways than we can count! The ellipses, you see,

continue to surround us to this day as God's Spirit continues to move and call us to paths unseen. Grounded in the God who greets us from the Bible, we are led by God beyond the pages to new movements that seek to share our love of God by loving the myriad of neighbors around us.

This is no easy task. This delicate balance of finding grounding from the inspired pages of our Scripture while keeping God's ultimate prominence is tough to maintain. That's why this fall we will be leading a new book study here at UIC. Together, we will be reading *Inspired*, written by the late Rachel Held-Evans. Held-Evans had herself been on the victimized side of bad bibliolatry and writes about what it took to fall back in love with the Bible again. I hope you will join us as we dive into the very texts we hold dear in order to gain better glimpses of God at work in the world. Because, rest assured, God has not stopped. There are plenty of ellipses waiting to be discovered beyond the pages. As John once again puts it: "there are also many other things Jesus did; if every one of them were written down, I suppose that the world itself could not contain what would be written" (John 21:25).

So, UIC, let's go see what God is . . .

INSPIRED BOOK STUDY

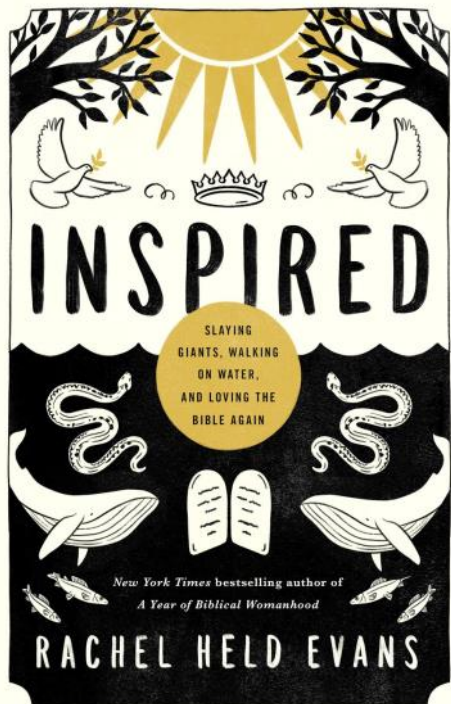
As we move into a new year of programming here at UIC, we are going to move straight to the source! This Fall we will be launching a new book study that will invite us to consider our perceptions, loves, and baggage with the biblical texts of our tradition. Together, we will work through Rachel Held Evans' book: *Inspired: Slaying Giants, Walking on Water, and Loving the Bible Again*. Together, we will engage in conversation that help us unpack what we encounter in scripture and consider how to hear words written millennia ago in the present day to encounter the God who is greater than the pages themselves.

Taking one chapter each week, the study will begin on **Wednesday, September 25th at 6:00pm**. Copies of the book are \$10 each, but assistance is available if the purchase would prevent participation. "If the Bible isn't a science book or an instruction manual, then what is it? What do people mean when they say the Bible is inspired? When Rachel Held Evans found herself asking these questions, she began a quest to better understand what the Bible is and how it is meant to be read. What she discovered

Drawing on the best in recent scholarship and using her well-honed literary expertise, Evans examines some of our favorite Bible stories and possible interpretations, retelling them through memoir, original poetry, short stories, soliloquies, and even a short screenplay. Undaunted by the Bible's most difficult passages, Evans wrestles through the process of doubting, imagining, and debating Scripture's mysteries. The Bible, she discovers, is not a static work but is a living, breathing, captivating, and confounding book that is able to equip us to join God's loving and redemptive work in the world."

Melvin G. Baker Jr., 92, of West Milton, passed away on Saturday, Aug. 10, 2019, at Geisinger Medical Center, Danville.

Born in Lewisburg on May 2, 1927, he was a son of the late Melvin Sr. and Mahala (Minium) Baker. He was married to the former Mary Mayer. His death breaks a marital union of 68 years.

Melvin was a 1946 graduate of Milton High School and served in the US Army during World War II and Korea. He was a self-employed mason and had retired from American Home Foods.

He was a life-long member of United In Christ Lutheran Church in Lewisburg and was a member of the Democratic Party in Lewisburg. He was a member of the United Food and Commercial Workers Union Local 38, a member of the PA State Sunday School Association, was a former Cub Scout and Boy Scout leader, and Little League Baseball coach. He enjoyed hunting and fishing.
