

### FROM THE PASTOR



My brothers and sisters, do you with your acts of favoritism really believe in our glorious Lord Jesus Christ? For if a person with gold rings and in fine clothes comes into your assembly, and if a poor person in dirty clothes also comes in, and if you take notice of the one wearing the fine clothes and say, "Have a seat here, please," while to the one who is poor you say, "Stand there," or, "Sit at my feet," have you not made distinctions among yourselves, and become judges with evil thoughts? Listen, my beloved brothers and sisters. Has not God chosen the poor in the world to be rich in faith and to be heirs of the kingdom that he has promised to those who love him? But you have dishonored the poor. Is it not the rich who oppress you? Is it not they who drag you into court? Is it not they who blaspheme the excellent name that was invoked over you? You do well if you really fulfill the royal law according to the scripture, "You shall love your neighbor as yourself."

James 2:1-8

Dear United In Christ,

I'll admit it: I thought *Mr. Rogers' Neighborhood* was incredibly boring when I was a kid.

I can remember the days when my brother and sister and I would gather around the television and pass by Mr. Rogers and his neighborhood in favor of landing on the next stupid cartoon airing on Nickelodeon. Revisiting the legacy of Fred Rogers now as an adult, particularly with all of the current cultural excitement surrounding his body of work, I find that I have no real sense of nostalgia for his cultural touchstones, but I am undoubtedly growing to appreciate the profound legacy he has left behind. It seems that now, more than ever, his guiding principles (and the deeply authentic faith that supported them) serve not only as a rudder for neighborly etiquette, but also as a beautiful rebuttal to the interpersonal discord we seem to have accepted as normal.

Take, for instance, the legacy he left in challenging the discord of his own time. One of the recurring examples of Mr. Rogers' powerful witness that I've seen pop up repeatedly of late is his boundary breaking episode from May of 1969. In the show that day, Mr. Rogers invited his friend, Officer Clemmons, to come and join him for a summer respite by soaking his feet with him in the backyard kiddie pool he'd set up to beat the heat. While the description of the act seems genuinely soft and touching enough to fit a children's program, the witness it provided spoke volumes to all who saw the scene. Airing in a cultural climate where racist practices of segregation, despite being made illegal, were still being enacted, this simple act of inviting a person of color to soak in the same waters as himself, a white man, demonstrated a radical response to Mr. Rogers' own daily question of "won't you be my neighbor?"

Despite an ethos that would otherwise have encouraged people like Mr. Rogers to see Officer Clemmons as anything but a neighbor he should care about, Mr. Rogers insisted on seeing the inherent human and holy dignity present in his neighbor. Reflecting years later in an interview with a family friend, it seems clear that what guided Mr. Rogers to embrace such human dignity and love his neighbor was nothing short of a faith-filled conviction he held close to his heart. "Evil would like nothing more than to have us feel awful about who we are," he said. "And that would be back [in our minds], and we'd look through those eyes at our neighbor, and see only what's awful – in fact, look for what's awful in our neighbor. . . But Jesus would want us to feel as good as possible about God's creation within us . . . and [in our minds], we would look through those eyes to see what's wonderful about our neighbor. I often think about that."

And you know, UIC, maybe we ought to often think about that as well because I think Mr. Rogers got it just right. Jesus would want us to feel good about God's creation within us, but then use that goodness to see the wonderful things about our neighbors, no matter who they are. After all, the same conviction that struck Mr. Rogers is the conviction that captured the heart of James when he wrote that those following in the life Jesus offered are indeed to show no par-

tiality on the basis of any difference or distinction. Instead, as he writes, we do well if we fulfill the royal law of scripture: to love our neighbors as ourselves."

In the next few weeks here at UIC, we will be taking seriously both Mr. Rogers lasting question of neighborliness and James' challenge to fulfill the royal law of loving those neighbors. Together with our neighbors at Saint Paul's UCC, we will be spending four weeks of study immersed in the faith lessons Mr. Rogers has to instill into our own time and place. This will be a wonderful opportunity for us to gather with our geographic neighbors to go back out and encounter new neighbors day after day with the love God has for them. Soon after, we will be starting a new book study using The Rev. Lenny Duncan's Dear Church: A Love Letter from a Black Preacher to Whitest Denomination in the US to continue in the legacy that Mr. Rogers displayed all those years ago with Officer Clemmons and ask how we can become better neighbors for those whom we often see on the basis of our differences in skin color, rather than on the God-given dignity offered to each of us.

So, United In Christ, can we do it? Can we have the courage to step out, walking past the distinctions that have tried to divide us to instead embrace a vulnerability that seeks genuine relationship with those different from us? Can we have the courage to see with the good of creation as Mr. Rogers did? Can we live the royal law towards which James calls us back? It's difficult work, and we won't always get it right, which is why I'm grateful we can be in this together. Together, we can echo Mr. Rogers' question to those whom we would otherwise pass by to ask: won't you be my neighbor?

### STEWARD YOUR LIFE: CULTIVATE A HEART OF LOVE

Jesus taught, "You have heard that it was said, 'You shall love your neighbor and hate your enemy.' But I say to you, Love your enemies and pray for those who persecute you, so that you may be children of your Father in heaven."—Matthew 5:43-44

Red hearts, flowers and chocolates remind us that February is the uncontested month of love.

It's excellent (and easy) to love those close to us, but Jesus tells us to go wider, deeper, riskier – to love even our enemies. In so doing, Jesus says, we become children of God.

This challenges us to embrace love as the key discipline and develop a heart so full of love that it flows to even our enemies. Isn't that how we're supposed to live as disciples? It's just good stewardship of our lives.

For this "month of love," practice loving your enemies.



The effort is especially timely in our season of discord, when our loudest voices encourage us – through name-calling, denigrating, lying, smearing – to hate those with whom we disagree. Even calling them "enemies" is too much (they're really neighbors!).

Loving our "enemies" doesn't mean we agree with them or tolerate bad behavior. It means respecting, listening, discussing, refraining from anger and revenge. Here are some ideas for loving our enemies:

- Jesus gives us the first step: Pray! For them and for you!
- Stop seeing them as enemies. They're our neighbors whom God loves.
- Resist hate, the very thing our culture encourages.
- Treat everyone as you would want to be treated.
- Lastly, keep praying.



By embracing love as a spiritual discipline, we cultivate a heart of love that opens our lives to the transformation Jesus dearly desires for us -- to be children of God. Now that's good stewardship.


### "DEAR CHURCH" BOOK STUDY

As we once again make our way into the coming Lenten season, a time of repentance and deep reflection, we will be starting a new book study here at UIC. Using The Rev. Lenny Duncan's book, *Dear Church: A Love Letter from a Black Preacher to the Whitest Denomination in the US*, we will encounter moving conversations around the role and tension of race within our own denomination that is 96% white. This challenging study will call us to encounter and seek repentance for the ways in which we participate in the systemic sin of racism, even when we don't realize our own roles. There may be times when we are faced with our own discomfort and hesitation, but together, even in the midst of our own sense of conviction, we will hear voices of truth-telling to seek new paths of good news and reconciliation with our neighbors of color, even within the Church.

We hope you can join us for this meaningful and world-shaping study. This study provides a critically important voice for us as we seek to be the Church today and live into the diverse world God has gifted to us. We will gather weekly starting on **Wednesday**, **March 4**<sup>th</sup> **at 6pm** and continuing throughout the season of Lent. Copies of the book are \$15 each, but assistance is available if the purchase would prevent participation. From the publisher: Lenny Duncan is the unlikeliest of pastors. Formerly incarcerated, he is now a black preacher in the whitest denomination in the United States: the Evangelical Lutheran Church in America (ELCA). Shifting demographics and shrinking congregations make all the headlines, but Duncan sees something else at work drawing a direct line between the church's lack of diversity and the church's lack of vitality. The problems the ELCA faces are theological, not sociological. But so are the answers.

Part manifesto, part confession, and all love letter, Dear Church offers a bold new vision for the future of Duncan's denomination and the broader mainline Christian community of faith. Dear Church rejects the narrative of church decline and calls everyone—leaders and laity alike—to the front lines of the church's renewal through racial equality and justice.

It is time for the church to rise up, dust itself off, and take on forces of this world that act against God: whiteness, misogyny, nationalism, homophobia, and economic injustice. Duncan gives a blueprint for the way forward and urges us to follow in the revolutionary path of Jesus.

### Joan Ellen Ketchem November 24, 1936 - January 5, 2020



Joan Ellen "Joanie" "Lightning" "Mom-In-Law" "Gram" "Gram-Meister" Ketchem, 83, of Ketchem Lane, Lewisburg, passed away on Jan. 5, 2020, at the Geisinger Medical Center, Danville.
