FROM THE PASTOR



Do you not know that all of us who have been baptized into Christ Jesus were baptized into his death? Therefore we have been buried with him by baptism into death, so that, just as Christ was raised from the dead by the glory of the Father, so we too might walk in newness of life. For if we have been united with him in a death like his, we will certainly be united with him in a resurrection like his. We know that our old self was crucified with him so that the body of sin might be destroyed, and we might no longer be enslaved to sin. For whoever has died is freed from sin. But if we have died with Christ, we believe that we will also live with him. We know that Christ, being raised from the dead, will never die again; death no longer has dominion over him. The death he died, he died to sin, once for all; but the life he lives, he lives to God. So you also must consider yourselves dead to sin and alive to God in Christ Jesus.

Romans 6:3-11

Dear United In Christ,

I will readily admit that I am a quintessential over-packer. Whether I'm going away for a week or just one night, I always have to make sure I have an extra set of clothes, a few extra pairs of socks, and maybe another t-shirt or two, you know, "just in case." I make sure that there's always enough space in my bag for my book, my iPad, and even a game or two, just so that I have something to do if there's some downtime wherever I'm going. When all is said and done, by the time I'm actually packed up and ready to head towards the destination, my bag is so weighed down that just getting it out to the car is its own journey!

Thinking about it, though, that might just be the reason why I find this season of Lent so daunting. As we journey into these

forty days through the wilderness together, we are reminded that, in this voyage in this season of genuine repentance we might just be called to leave some things behind. These days of Lent are meant as a time for us to take honest stock of what all we've packed away to see that there might just be some things that don't belong in our bags. And I don't mean just the chocolate or soda or beer we've committed to staying away from until Easter. I'm talking about the often more insidious things — things that we didn't even know we packed — that rob us of living fully into the life and love to which God has called us *and* that stop us from seeing our neighbors as worthy of that same God's love.

See, in this Lenten journey, in seeking repentance and taking stock of the ways we have failed to live fully into our calling as disciples, we might just find that there are some systems, policies, practices, or assumptions that we need to die to along the way. As we seek to follow the path of discipleship that Jesus paved for us, a path predicated on a love for God and a love for neighbor, we may find that the systems of racism, sexism, homophobia, and xenophobia that have for so long told us how to see our neighbors have snuck into the bags we've packed, but really need to be left behind in the wilderness. We may find that we need to die to the grasps they hold on us to walk in the new path of repentance that this season offers.

I'll be honest, UIC, this may be intimidating work, but rest assured: it is the very work to which we have been called and the work for which we have been commissioned. Paul describes it well in his letter to the Romans above. In each of our baptisms, he says, we have been united to both the death *and* resurrection of Jesus Christ. This means that we have been buried, therefore, with him by baptism; our old selves – those parts that participate in the death-dealing systems of the world – have been crucified with Christ so that we may no longer be enslaved to such sin and brokenness. In turn, we are raised to new life in Jesus' resurrection so that we also may consider ourselves dead to sin and alive to God in Jesus Christ.

In this call, on this journey, parts of us might just die here in the wilderness – and that's okay. Joined with Christ, we can bear the hope of finding a new way forward, a path shown for us in the life-giving ways Jesus had to offer. Joined together with Christ, we know that we are not alone on this journey. As we embrace this wilderness and its difficult and deadly terrain together this Lent, I hope that you will join us for the challenging road ahead. I hope you will join us for our book study this Lent as we walk with Rev. Lenny Duncan in Dear Church to hear the broken spaces of repentance we need to seek and the sinful practices to which we need to die in order to truly and genuinely greet the neighbors around us whom the Church has historically failed on the basis of race, sexuality, or socioeconomics. I hope you will join us in the oasis worship to hear the unfolding love of God delivered to rescue us from such ways of brokenness and find respite in the gifts of God out poured out for you. I hope you will find strength and courage for this journey of repentance to find the hope of a new way forward in God's resurrection love for the sake of this world.

I hope, United In Christ, that you know how grateful I am for your accompaniment on this difficult Lenten journey. Together, I trust that we can head into this wilderness together, not undaunted, but rather encouraged by the work of our shared calling. Together, I know that we can leave some baggage behind and greet the joy of the Easter dawn that waits at this journey's end. Now, let's get going.

STEWARD YOUR SOUL FOR A FULLER LIFE

Jesus teaches, "What good is it for someone to gain the whole world, yet forfeit their soul? Or what can anyone give in exchange for their soul?"—Mark 8:36, 37 (NIV)

Instead of the superficial "How's it going?" a wise colleague asks friends, "How is your soul?"

The question requires effort. To answer it I must plunge deep inside -below the constantly churning waters of everyday joys, hopes, ambitions, desires, anxieties and disappointments. These are so strong, especially our desires and ambitions, that if we are not careful they can absorb all our time and energy.

Jesus repeatedly warns us not to let our desires and our worries engulf us, keeping us from paying attention to the soul. Our soul is where we connect with God, the source of our greatest strength and truest identity. Without attention, our soul can dry up like a plant without water. As with all the treasures God has given us, we must be stewards of our souls.

The mystics of old and modern prophets (such as Richard Rohr, Marjorie Thompson or Howard Thurman) teach us to employ prayer, holy silence, and other spiritual disciplines to tend our souls and keep worldly worries and desires from overwhelming us.

This month, begin a daily practice of caring for your soul. You might begin with five minutes of spoken prayer followed by five minutes of silence. Or reflect deeply on a Scripture passage. Or try prayerful yoga. (Your pastor might be able to give you some resources or ideas.)

With a little practice and attention, you can become stronger, more centered and more spiritually resilient. How is your soul?

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
"DEAR CHURCH" BOOK STUDY

As we once again make our way into the coming Lenten season, a time of repentance and deep reflection, we will be starting a new book study here at UIC. Using The Rev. Lenny Duncan's book, *Dear Church: A Love Letter from a Black Preacher to the Whitest Denomination in the US*, we will encounter moving conversations around the role and tension of race within our own denomination that is 96% white. This challenging study will call us to encounter and seek repentance for the ways in which we participate in the systemic sin of racism, even when we don't realize our own roles. There may be times when we are faced with our own discomfort and hesitation, but together, even in the midst of our own sense of conviction, we will hear voices of truth-telling to seek new paths of good news and reconciliation with our neighbors of color, even within the Church.

We hope you can join us for this meaningful and world-shaping study. This study provides a critically important voice for us as we seek to be the Church today and live into the diverse world God has gifted to us. We will gather weekly starting on **Wednesday, March 4**th **at 6pm** and continuing throughout the season of Lent. Copies of the book are \$15 each, but assistance is available if the purchase would prevent participation. From the publisher: Lenny Duncan is the unlikeliest of pastors. Formerly incarcerated, he is now a black preacher in the whitest denomination in the United States: the Evangelical Lutheran Church in America (ELCA). Shifting demographics and shrinking congregations make all the headlines, but Duncan sees something else at work drawing a direct line between the church's lack of diversity and the church's lack of vitality. The problems the ELCA faces are theological, not sociological. But so are the answers.

Part manifesto, part confession, and all love letter, Dear Church offers a bold new vision for the future of Duncan's denomination and the broader mainline Christian community of faith. Dear Church rejects the narrative of church decline and calls everyone—leaders and laity alike—to the front lines of the church's renewal through racial equality and justice.

It is time for the church to rise up, dust itself off, and take on forces of this world that act against God: whiteness, misogyny, nationalism, homophobia, and economic injustice. Duncan gives a blueprint for the way forward and urges us to follow in the revolutionary path of Jesus.
