# FROM THE PASTOR



From now on, therefore, we regard no one from a human point of view; even though we once knew Christ from a human point of view, we know him no longer in that way. So if anyone is in Christ, there is a new creation: everything old has passed away; see, everything has become new! All this is from God, who reconciled us to himself through Christ, and has given us the ministry of reconciliation; that is, in Christ God was reconciling the world to himself, not counting their trespasses against them, and entrusting the message of reconciliation to us. So we are ambassadors for Christ, since God is making his appeal through us; we entreat you on behalf of Christ, be reconciled to God. For our sake he made him to be sin who knew no sin, so that in him we might become the righteousness of God.

2 Corinthians 5:16-21

#### Dear United In Christ,

It's not that easy bein' green. Do you remember the lament? It's the one Kermit the Frog famously sang on Sesame Street in its first year on the air. It was made famous in the Lingenfelter household, though, with the cassette tape of "Kermit Unpigged" that lived in our family minivan. The tracks were made up of various covers of Muppets singing famous songs with (at the time of 1994) contemporary artists. This included a particularly stellar track of "Born to Be Wild" sung by Miss Piggy and *Ozzy Osbourne*, of all people. To reprise the Sesame Street special, though, Kermit joins with Vince Gil to explore all that comes with "Bein' Green."

As a kid, I'll admit that the track slowed down the overall pace of the Muppets, but coming back again to the song these years later opens up a deeply intrinsic journey of self-acceptance that seems remarkably introspective for children's programming. Kermit starts by expressing his disappointment at being the same color as the leaves and "so many ordinary things" while longing for a way to stand out like red or yellow or gold. Yet, by the end of the song, Kermit arrives at a place of reconciliation: there may be times when he longs to be something else, but in his greenness he shares a beauty with the likes of the mountains, the ocean, and the trees. In the last line, he finally concludes that "I'm green and it'll do fine; it's beautiful and I think it's what I want to be."

While I don't think any of us are necessarily lamenting a current green state these days, it seems as if we could stand to benefit from the journey of reconciliation on which Kermit finds himself in this song. As we enter into the season of Lent, we begin now a similar time of introspection and self-reflective honesty. With the same quiet vulnerability as this green puppet frog, we begin this journey with the courage to ask difficult questions about ourselves, about who we are, and about how we move through our world. Lent is a time of hard self-awareness; it requires us to look boldly at the portions of ourselves that we'd rather keep tucked away and hidden. At the same time, it invites us to heed a call of discipleship to act differently, to follow Jesus down a risky and new path wherein we might find a place of reconciliation with ourselves, with our neighbors, and with God.

See, while it's not that easy bein' green, it's not easy bein' new either. Paul must have known this well (I can imagine him joining

the song alongside Kermit). In this writing to the Corinthian community, we can hear him seeking that journey. After delivering a message to them about the profound unity in the body of Christ, now he writes seeking out that unity on a personal level. The community is displeased with him, so here he seeks his own course of reconciliation. Yet, in that course he recognizes that he is not grounded by his own strength. He is not able to set *himself* right; instead he understands that he is reconciled (to God *and* the Corinthians) through Christ. Having first regarded him from a human point of view — having first operated in a world where sight came through a monotone lens of boring green-ness — *now* he invites a vision beyond that human vista. Now he reminds them: "everything old has passed away; see, everything has become new!"

And that, United In Christ, is the hope of our Lenten journey. As we start with the dull ashes imposed upon us, as we hear again the reminder that we are dust (that we are green?), we will be reminded that even the dust is reconciled to God, and thus the dusty beings that we are can be reconciled to one another. I pray that you find strength for this journey ahead. I pray that you bring a vulnerability that is honest enough to name where you feel inadequate. I pray that you bring a courage to admit where you have participated in the patterns of the world that need to be left behind for true reconciliation to take place. But I trust that you will be met by the God making all things new. I trust that, even beyond the green and dust of our vision, you will see the promise of resurrection waiting just past the stony horizon.

### **ASHES TO-GO**

Can't make it to Ash Wednesday worship? Stop by the corner of Race Street and Front Street in Milton for "Ashes To-Go!" From 12:00pm-6:00pm on March 2<sup>nd</sup>, Pastor Justin will be available with Pastor Gary Schaeffer (Milton Lutheran Church) and Pastor Tim Hogan-Palazzo (Saint Paul's UCC) to provide imposition of ashes for anyone in the community! Be sure to come by this Ash Wednesday!





Volunteering is a great way to feel like part of this community while serving Jesus at the same time.

Currently each worship service has 13 volunteer spots to fill. We are currently not passing the offering plate so Ushers are not needed and we don't regularly have school age children in worship so we have not been scheduling Acolytes.

Thirteen spots a week, 52 spots a month! That's why you see the same people listed multiple times on the volunteer schedule.

### Interested in how you can serve?

If you would like to volunteer please grab a Worship *Volunteer Form* from the front bulletin board in the fellowship hall, fill it out and place it in Terri Cromwell's mailbox and she will contact you.

**Altar Guild:** Altar Guild does not require a large time commitment but is vital. Responsibilities include setting up the elements of wine and bread before service & clean up after service. Altar Guild occasionally changes the altar and pulpit cloths as the church seasons change throughout the year. (training available)

**Bread/Wine:** A loaf of unsliced bread is brought to the church at least 30 minutes before service begins and \$5 is given for the purchase of communion wine.

**Communion Assistant:** Each service, three Communion Assistants assist the pastor in distributing communion wine and bread during communion. (*training available*)

**Digital Host:** Did you know we had over 2,000 sermons watched in 2021? The Digital Host holds the camera which streams worship. Don't worry the viewers can't hear you sing! We have separate mics that record the sound from up front.

**Guest Relations:** Guest Relations remains in the fellowship hall during worship incase a late visitor arrives or a visitor needs assistance. (training available)

**Greeter:** Greeters are essential for providing a welcoming environment, handing out bulletins, and answering questions like where to find things in the building. There is 1 greeter at the side door and 2 at the front door, 2 in case 1 greeter gets busy talking to a newcomer or visitor. Having someone stationed at the doors to assist people can be the difference as to whether someone visits us again. Greeters arrive at church 30 minutes prior to worship.

**Lector:** Lector reads the 1st reading from the pulpit. The reading is emailed ahead of time so you can become familiar with it.

**Offering Counter:** A team of 2 counters prepare the deposit after each worship service. *(training available)*

the congregation by giving us an inward glimpse of what genuine welcome looks like across racial lines. Given the nature of this study and the work it means for UIC, participation in these *Dialogues* series (look for another after Easter) is highly encouraged for our members. Recognizing its importance, UIC's Congregational Council has also agreed to make the accompanying books for this study *free* to all participants! #### MILTON'S COMMUNITY MEAL

In 2016 Milton Lutheran churches began serving a bi-monthly community meal. Then Covid hit and the meals paused.



In June 2021 the meals resumed with the collaboration of MLC (Milton Lutheran Church) and Saint Paul's UCC. MLC and Saint Paul's have been serving around 220 people at each community meal. They do a drive-though at 1125 Mahoning St., Milton and also deliver meals to Milton Towners and Milton Developmental Services.

# UIC is happy to announce we are joining the partnership!

The next meal is Sunday, March 13 and the menu is goulash, tossed salad, applesauce, and bread pudding.

UIC has been given a list of ingredients, which have been equally divided between the three churches. All of the items that require refrigeration will be purchased with the Community Meal Fund. There is a signup sheet on the bulletin board in the fellowship hall of other grocery items needed.

Prep and cooking is done the day before the meal. Social Ministry will deliver all the grocery items to MLC the evening of March 11.

**Volunteers are only needed the day of the meal.** They have enough help the day before to prep and cook everything. Please see the signup sheet.

With your help we were able to bless our 5 college students for Valentine's Day. You gave \$396, five \$25 gifts cards (1 for each student), and a bunch of greeting cards for each student.

Social Ministry used the \$396, plus \$7.29 from Social Ministry budget line, to purchase a \$50 gift card for each student and \$30 in gifts for each student. Per Pastor Justin, postage to mail packages came out of the Pastor's Discretionary Fund.

Boy Scouts delivered 1,220 food items to Milton Panther Packs which provides Milton students with backpacks of food over the weekends, when school meals are not available. Every week there are over 250 children that take home food backpacks.





As of 2/20/22, we have received \$140 in donations for the Community Meal Fund which will be used to sponsor meals at the Sharing Our Tables community meal in Milton.

#### RICH HUFF FUND
