FROM THE PASTOR

Now on that same day two of them were going to a village called Emmaus, about seven miles from Jerusalem, and talking with each other about all these things that had happened. While they were talking and discussing, Jesus himself came near and went with them, but their eyes were kept from recognizing him ... As they came near the village to which they were going, he walked ahead as if he were going on. But they urged him strongly, saying, "Stay with us, because it is almost evening and the day is now nearly over." So he went in to stay with them. When he was at the table with them, he took bread. blessed and broke it, and gave it to them. Then their eyes were opened, and they recognized him; and he vanished from their sight. They said to each other, "Were not our hearts burning within us while he was talking to us on the road, while he was opening the scriptures to us?" That same hour they got up and returned to Jerusalem; and they found the eleven and their companions gathered together. They were saying, "The Lord has risen indeed, and he has appeared to Simon!" Then they told what had happened on the road, and how he had been made known to them in the breaking of the bread.

~ Luke 24:13-16, 28-35

Dear United In Christ,

I get it. Sometimes resurrection just doesn't seem possible. With all of the clamor and strain going on in our lives, sometimes new life does not feel like the most likely of situations. When our vision is tunneled in on the new medical prognosis or the new employment status or the crawling anxiety of the doomscroll or the updates to any myriad of ongoing catastrophes across our television screens, it might feel like we're already riding in the handbasket with a singular destination ahead. I mean, you don't need me to point it out for you; you could fill in the blank (or a whole page worth of blanks) with the gnawing concerns and anxieties that occupy your days. With so much consuming our worlds and our worries, we simply mighty not have room to see resurrected life as a possibility.

Turns out, you're not alone. In fact, if you are struggling to see such possibilities around us then it turns out you're in guite good company. As Luke tells the Easter story, the disciples themselves struggled to see the reality of resurrection even as it was right in their face. Can you blame them? Having journeyed through the excruciating events of a week we now label as "Holy," they watched as their friend and teacher was betrayed, arrested, beaten, and crucified in a public display of unfettered power. As intended by the state that carried out the course of actions, it was a downright demoralizing series of events. Jesus' disciples had had their worlds turned on their heads. The pain and hurt was all that they could see – it was all they could *imagine* in the moment. Even as the resurrected Christ appears with them on the road to Emmaus, they fail to recognize him. After all, they'd seen him dead and buried! That was a pretty definitive ending without much room for any other possibilities.

Yet, even while they cannot conceive of the possibility of new life, the resurrected Jesus shows up anyway. He comes alongside them, he hears the troubled focus of their world, and he journeys with them, opening up the heart of scripture to the reality of their painful situation. His comfort, even while they still don't recognize him, is enough to make the disciples invite him to stay awhile with them. It's not until later, when they gather around the familiar intimacy of the table (the same intimacy violated in betrayal by one of their own just a few nights ago at a different table) that they recognize their teacher in their midst, once more breaking bread with them and *for them*. In that moment, the disciples' eyes are opened and now they see: new life isn't just a possibility, *it's already in their midst*.

And that, United In Christ, is the sort of risen solace we need. As we take these last few days of our Lenten journey together, despite all appearances to the contrary, we find that we are quickly approaching the possibility of new life. In fact, *it's already here*. The risen Christ is already in our midst bearing signs of new life for you. In the familiar setting around the table, in the comfort food of bread broken among friends, *you* are being met with the signs of resurrected life being born into the world. Fed and sustained, met by the new possibilities Jesus offers, we then find our calling to face the world anew – to look back out and similarly put these signs of life on full display. In the quickly approaching Easter, we find our calling to share the good news that resurrection *is* possible and it is here! May you share its signs with a world desperate to see something new!

COMMUNITY LEVEL-BASED MASKING GUIDELINES

At the March 15th, 2022 meeting of UIC's Congregational Council, the Council voted to adopt masking and building policy guidance based on the CDC's "Community Level" guidelines. This policy will replace the former policy that was based on the CDC's transmission rate guidelines. The difference between these two metrics is that while the transmission rate guidelines were based solely off of the current pace of new cases in the county, the "Community Level" guidance accounts for the overall strain on the healthcare/hospital system in the area. This metric uses a green-yellow-red phase indicator to offer masking and intervention guidance for response. With this scale, red is a phase of high strain requiring greater intervention, yellow is a phase of medium strain that encourages some intervention, particularly for individuals with ongoing health concerns, and green is a phase of relatively low strain requiring the least amount of preventative measures.

What do these Community Levels mean for United In Christ?

Following the CDC recommendations, UIC will adopt the following adjustments for each phase:

Red Phase:

• Masks will be expected to be worn at all times while inside the building.

- Pews will be marked to encourage social distancing.
- Indoor meal opportunities will be avoided.

Yellow Phase:

- Masks will be optional while inside the building.
- Individuals with ongoing health concerns are encouraged to consult their doctor about what masking strategy is appropriate for them.
- Communion assistants will be asked to wear a mask during

the distribution of communion in worship.

- Pews will remain marked to encourage voluntary social distancing.
- Indoor meal opportunities will be allowed.

Green Phase:

- Masks will be optional while inside the building.
- We will remove the pew markers.
- Indoor meal opportunities will be allowed.

<u>All Phases:</u>

• Mask wearing will be seen as a sign of good care for neighbor and for self. Those who would prefer to continue to wearing masks are welcome to do so.

- HEPA-grade air purifiers will be run throughout worship.
- Online streaming of worship will continue for anyone who wishes to join from home.
- If you are feeling sick, we lovingly encourage you to stay home to help keep our community safe, but reach out to let us know so that we can support you with care, prayer, and love!
- If you have not already, please consider receiving your full COVID-19 vaccine course and keep up with boosters as-needed. While you're at it, don't forget to get your seasonal flu shot!

When does this start?

These new guidelines take effect on Monday, March 21st, thus, the first Sunday that will be affected by these guidelines will be **Sunday, March 27th!** As of writing this, Union County remains in a yellow phase. This means that, barring any major changes, masks will be optional for worship beginning on the 27th.

I'm still confused.

You're not alone. There is constantly updating information and standards. The Congregational Council has done a magnificent job of trying to stay as up-to-date as possible in order to respond as responsibly as they can. 


SCOUT SUNDAY April 24
