### FROM THE DASTOR



For our sake he made him to be sin who knew no sin, so that in him we might become the righteousness of God. As we work together with him, we urge you also not to accept the grace of God in vain. For he says, "At an acceptable time I have listened to you, and on a day of salvation I have helped you." See, now is the acceptable time; see, now is the day of salvation! We are putting no obstacle in anyone's way, so that no fault may be found with our ministry, but as servants of God we have commended ourselves in every way: through great endurance, in afflictions, hardships, calamities, beatings, imprisonments, riots, labors, sleepless nights, hunger; by purity, knowledge, patience, kindness, holiness of spirit, genuine love, truthful speech, and the power of God; with the weapons of righteousness for the right hand and for the left; in honor and dishonor, in ill repute and good repute. We are treated as impostors, and yet are true; as unknown, and yet are well known; as dying, and see—we are alive; as punished, and yet not killed; as sorrowful, yet always rejoicing; as poor, yet making many rich; as having nothing, and yet possessing everything.

2 Corinthians 5:21-6:10

#### Dear United In Christ,

Can you imagine if we started greeting each other for Ash Wednesday and Lent in the ways we do for Christmas and Easter? I think the cognitive dissonance would be startling! Try it: "Happy Lent!" "Merry Ash Wednesday!" It feels weird, doesn't it? Such a chipper salutation for such a seemingly somber season feels off somehow. It's like our brains can't quite wrap our heads around the idea of embracing Lent as something worth celebrating; instead we treat it as something that we simply need to endure, as if we just need to grin and bear it.

Because in more than a few ways, it's discomforting, isn't it? This annual imperative to *memento mori*, the declaration that we are "but dust and to dust we shall return" is not a reminder we necessarily going running towards on a daily basis. What's more is that we seem to double down in this wilderness journey. Not only do we take this time to look mortality in the face, but we do so with the reflection of self-examination that calls us to seek out our faults, our own faults, our own most grievous faults. You can excuse someone, then, for not feeling very merry this time of year!

But maybe there *is* some merit to a more positive attitude towards this Lenten season. Maybe this ashy reminder isn't meant to just make us feel like dirt, but rather is meant to help us know the God who *loves* the dirt. The reminder of our dusty beginnings and dusty endings are less of an aspiration or prescription and are instead more of a promise, trusting that both dusty bookends are held in the love and care of the God who breathes life into the dust. Maybe the ashy nature of the season ahead is less of a goal for what we *need to be* and more of a statement of quality that describes things *as they already are*.

To be clear: I'm not trying to diminish the penitential nature of the season — we can always benefit from growing more comfortable with a little more self-examination — but maybe our chest-beating needs to be reframed. We don't deprive ourselves during these forty days in order to regain enough spiritual credit to move forward. The Lenten call of penitence is to look deep within and name the places where we've gone wrong against God and against our neighbors and then to see the signs of God's grace meeting us while we commit to doing better. Our Lenten practices of giving things up or taking on new patterns, then, become tangible means of solidarity. They become a way for us to see the dusty nature of the world in solidarity with that

world and then love it and its people in word and deed as God does.

In this way, then, Lent becomes a means of liberation. It's the sort of irony of which Paul writes; that in solidarity with those amid hardship, in sharing kinship with those going through great endurance, in afflictions, hardships, calamities, beatings, imprisonments, riots, labors, sleepless nights, and hunger we bring hope as those who know the value that God imbues such fragile dust, indeed as those dying, yet very much alive. In this season, with all of our examination of our individual and corporate faults, we can embody the vulnerability needed to actually make a difference. Once we see that we are indeed but dust, we can insist on a dusty dignity for God's beloved moving forward.

So may your Lent be liberating, UIC. May your Ash Wednesday be filled with the promises of God's grace made not in vain, but in the hope of God's steadfast promises.

#### WORSHIP VOLUNTEERING

Have you ever wondered what it takes to make Sunday morning go smoothly? There are the obvious things like Pastor Justin and Vicar Katy running around handing out prayers before worship and the altar guild preparing communion before worship.

But did you know that for EVERY Sunday Terri finds nearly twenty volunteers to help out? That is a lot of people! Some of these roles are certainly more visible than others—we see the ushers who help during offering, we see those who read up front. But did you realize that we have someone who sits in the fellowship hall during the service to greet any late arrivals? With so many ways to help serve, it can be hard to keep track of what these roles are and the responsibilities for them. Here is a quick break down as you consider how you can be involved!



Altar Guild: Altar guild does not require a large time commitment, but it is vital to worship. Responsibilities include setting up the elements of wine and bread before service and clean up after the service. Altar Guild occasionally changes the altar and pulpit cloths as the church seasons change throughout the year. (*Training is available*)

**Bread/Wine:** A loaf of unsliced is brought to the church at least 30 minutes before the service begins and \$5 is given for the purchase of communion wine.

**Communion Assistant:** Every week during worship two Communion Assistants help the pastor and vicar in distributing communion wine. (*Training is available*)

**Digital Host:** Did you know we had over 2,000 sermons watched in 2021? The Digital Host holds the camera which streams worship. Don't worry the viewers can't hear you sing or snore your way through the sermon! We have separate mics that record the sound from up front.

**Guest Relations:** Guest relations remains in the fellowship hall during worship in case a late visitor arrives or someone needs assistance during worship. (*Training is available*)

**Greeter:** Greeters are essential for providing a welcoming environment, handing out bulletins, and answering question like where to find things in the building. There is one (1) greeter at the elevator entrance and two (2) at the front door—multiple greeters ensures that all who walk through our doors are welcomed. Greeters arrive at the church 30 minutes prior to worship.

**Lector:** Lector reads the first lesson during worship from the pulpit. The reading is emailed ahead of time so that you can become familiar with it. If you are worried about pronouncing any words in the reading, Pastor Justin and Vicar Katy are more than happy to help out there (they sometimes guess when pronouncing it, too!).

**Offering Counter:** A team of two people who count Sunday's offering and prepare the deposit after each worship service. The counters will also check the safe for any deposits that might have come in during the week. One of them will then take it to the bank to be deposited. (*Training is available*)

**Social Hour:** When your last name falls under the alphabetical range for the week, you are invited to bring a snack to share during our post-worship social hour and then stick around to help with the kitchen clean up afterward! Many hands make much lighter work for Social Hour!

#### ASH WEDNESDAY STEWARDSHIP

"Remember that you are dust, and to dust you shall return." -Evangelical Lutheran Worship, p. 254

With these ancient words from Genesis 3:19 and the swipe of a dirty thumb across our foreheads, Ash Wednesday propels us into Lent with the proper context to understand our lives as stewards of the riches God entrusts to us.

The essential teaching of Ash Wednesday – that we are just mortals, after all – crushes our ego, dispels our pretentions, and drives us deep into God's mysteries. Why are we here? What are our lives all about? What's *really* important? Pray over these questions and profound insights emerge.

We are dust. Yes, but we are God's dust. Our body consists of trillions of atoms, each a speck of "dust" created by of God, billions of years ago. God put us together from the stuff of the universe.

• Therefore, we are quite literally "earthy" beings, made of the same material as air, water, soil and stone. Part of creation, we work to preserve and sustain God's creation for future generations.

Therefore, we revere and care for our bodies through healthy living.

We are breath. We are not *only* dust. Genesis 2:7 describes us as "dust" into which God has "breathed the Holy breath of life." Our lives are the breath of God in our dust.

• Therefore, every breath we take is holy, a prayer that whispers God's praise.

Therefore, we look to God to align our lives with God's holy reality that arcs towards peace, love, joy, justice, and truth.

**Our time is brief.** The "dust" that is us *will* return to the earth. We have a finite number of minutes.


- Therefore, every hour, every second is sacred. There is not a single moment one to waste. We spend our time wisely, carefully, prayerfully.
- Therefore, we do not cling to our possessions, knowing that we will leave it all behind.

Therefore, we nourish our lives with lasting treasures – relationships, trust, love, joy, service, generosity, and harmony.

This Lent spend time in prayer, with openness and honesty. See how God will transforming you into the person you were created to be. Reflect each day on Ash Wednesday. "Remember you are dust, and to dust you shall return."




