FROM THE PASTOR



The hand of the LORD came upon me, and he brought me out by the spirit of the LORD and set me down in the middle of a valley; it was full of bones. He led me all around them; there were very many lying in the valley, and they were very dry. He said to me, "Mortal, can these bones live?" I answered, "O Lord GOD, you know." Then he said to me, "Prophesy to these bones, and say to them: O dry bones, hear the word of the LORD. Thus says the Lord GOD to these bones: I will cause breath to enter you, and you shall live. I will lay sinews on you, and will cause flesh to come upon you, and cover you with skin, and put breath in you, and you shall live; and you shall know that I am the LORD."

Ezekiel 37:1-5

Dear United In Christ,

I know that this will come as a great shock to many of you, but I play a lot of really nerdy games. I mean — really nerdy. I'm talking video games, board games, Dungeons and Dragons; I'm here for all of it. Some might say that I'm a particular connoisseur of the hack-and-slash genre. You know, the games where you suit up in a full plat of armor, grab the nearest, biggest sword you can find and start slicing away in the nearest dungeons. They're the kind of games where, if you're lucky, you get the privilege of taking on a dragon, but only after you make your way through all of the minions first. Because something is always in the way, like a horde of zombies or an army of goblins.

And skeletons. So. Many. Skeletons. It's a trope that just doesn't seem to get old across the genre. These mindless remains of adventurers of old reanimate as a sort of dormant security

system impeding the hero from reaching the ultimate treasure. They animate as echoes of the lives they led and stand to thwart the progress of the living from reaching their goal. These games (and books and movies) are *full* of these skeletal foes that append themselves with the clatter of ossified assembly, like a dry-rotted xylophone mending itself together.

I think it's all of these goofy games that have so embedded themselves in my mind that makes it so hard for me to shake their image every time I read this passage from Ezekiel. As the prophet looks out over this valley of dry bones, I can only picture these gamified remains rising up together. As they rattle together in assembly (verse 7), there summons the image of what those skeletal remains must have once been. It's easy to think of them as the haunting vestiges of life. It's easy to think that these dry bones carry only a fraction of their former potential. It's easy to think that they are merely the echoes of what they once were.

But not when God gets to them. As God encourages the prophet to prophesy to these bones, the breath/Spirit/wind (it's all the same word in Hebrew) of God moves into them and they join together once more. They no longer remain as dry bone, but with sinew on sinew they are breathed by the wind of God, and their spirits are made whole. As God explains, such is God's ways, just as it was in the beginning garden scene where God filled the dust with God's breath and made the first human.

It's a timely reminder that comes to us this Lenten season. As we journey into the wilderness together, as we trek across the sometimes seemingly barren spaces, here we are reminded of just what a valley of bones can become. This season together is a time not just for penitential brow-beating, of descending ourselves into a valley of dust. It's not a time to wallow in our boney state of being. It's a time in which we give space for the newness of God's wind/breath/Spirit to move among us, reanimating us for God's prophetic work ahead.

Lent isn't a time to ask how we go on as the reanimated remains of what we once were (like the skeletons from all those games), it's a time to ask how we might live into whom the very breath of God is calling us to be. It's a time for self-reflection and understanding. It's a time to take note of where God is showing up to make a way forward in our lives and in our community. It's a time that acknowledges our bare bones, but ultimately brings us one step closer into the fullness of life that God is breathing here and now.

May you and your bones catch your breath this Lent, UIC.



ASH WEDNESDAY STEWARDSHIP

"Remember that you are dust, and to dust you shall return." - **Evangelical Lutheran Worship**, p. 254

With these ancient words from Genesis 3:19 and the swipe of a dirty thumb across our foreheads, Ash Wednesday propels us into Lent with the proper context to understand our lives as stewards of the riches God entrusts to us.

The essential teaching of Ash Wednesday – that we are just mortals, after all – crushes our ego, dispels our pretentions, and drives us deep into God's mysteries. Why are we here? What are our lives all about? What's *really* important? Pray over these questions and profound insights emerge.

We are dust. Yes, but we are *God's* dust. Our body consists of trillions of atoms, each a speck of "dust" created by of God, billions of years ago. God put us together from the stuff of the universe.

- Therefore, we are quite literally "earthy" beings, made of the same material as air, water, soil and stone. Part of creation, we work to preserve and sustain God's creation for future generations.
- Therefore, we revere and care for our bodies through healthy living.

We are breath. We are not *only* dust. Genesis 2:7 describes us as "dust" into which God has "breathed the Holy breath of life." Our lives are the breath of God in our dust.

• Therefore, every breath we take is holy, a prayer that whispers God's praise.

• Therefore, we look to God to align our lives with God's holy reality that arcs towards peace, love, joy, justice, and truth.

Our time is brief. The "dust" that is us *will* return to the earth. We have a finite number of minutes.

- Therefore, every hour, every second is sacred. There is not a single moment to waste. We spend our time wisely, carefully, prayerfully.
- Therefore, we do not cling to our possessions, knowing that we will leave it all behind.
- Therefore, we nourish our lives with lasting treasures relationships, trust, love, joy, service, generosity, and harmony.

This Lent spend time in prayer, with openness and honesty. See how God will transforming you into the person you were created to be. Reflect each day on Ash Wednesday. "Remember you are dust, and to dust you shall return."


Are you or a loved one in need of prayer?
