

# FROM THE PASTOR



When the Pharisees heard that he had silenced the Sadducees, they gathered together, and one of them, a lawyer, asked him a question to test him. "Teacher, which commandment in the law is the greatest?" He said to him, "'You shall love the Lord your God with all your heart, and with all your soul, and with all your mind.' This is the greatest and first commandment. And a second is like it: 'You shall love your neighbor as yourself.' On these two commandments hang all the law and the prophets."

Matthew 22:34-40

Dear United In Christ,

All of them? Really?

Is Jesus really so sure about that? That seems like a pretty big gamble if you ask me! To say as he does here in Matthew's Gospel that all 613 instructions of the Hebrew Scriptures, to say that the entire plurality of voices lifted up from the prophets to the powers of their time, to say that this great body of testimony to faithful living as God's people hangs on the dual instruction to love God and love neighbor feels rather audacious, doesn't it? In some ways it feels like an oversimplification; can everything in this course of faithful living *really* be boiled down to loving God and loving our neighbors? More direly perhaps, though, is the question of what this looks like in the first place! With a clear-cut set of laws, it is at least easy to discern a course of action between right and wrong! But with as broad a principle as *love* at the helm, it seems as if there would be a pretty wide interpretive range of what such loving action would look like!

But then again, maybe that is part of the point. Maybe the gift that Jesus is offering is actually a liberating one, both for our neighbors *and* for our sake. His offering of greatest instruction is one that seems to call us to step away from trying to micromanage into righteousness the actions of those around us — as well as our own — and to instead embrace a simpler course of love for God's sake. With such love as our guidepost, we are freed from worrying about causing infractions along stringent lines of decency and order. Instead we are called to courageously reach back into the world and build up the lives of the neighbors in our midst, trusting that offering such loving action will just as equally proclaim a love of the God present in each of those neighbors we meet.

And maybe, 2000 years later, maybe this simplified instruction is still the course correction we need. In a time and place where there are plenty of Christian voices telling our neighbors how they need to act and how they need to live and how they need to vote and how they need to love and how they need to earn their value and how they need to present themselves and how they need to *exist*, maybe Jesus is offering a course correction for us once more. If all the law and prophets, all the guiding principles really hang on this love of God and love of neighbor, then we are freed from agonizing over all of the particular details of discipline to instead focus on this greater course of love!

I mean, this is certainly how the Reformers understood this new course! They understood that this liberating law of love was what underscored their principles of being justified by God's grace through the gift of faith. From their perspective, it wasn't well-grounded obedience or proper maintenance of behavior that made anyone stand before God in righteousness. Instead, it was simply God's loving act of grace received in faith that situated God's people in the bonds of God's love. Martin Luther himself got particularly feisty around this insistence. Looking at the church gathering around him that was squabbling over the details of proper behavior and order he wrote: "[if] participants in the council were to deal with the chief concerns in the spiritual and secular estates that are opposed to God, then their

hands would be so full that they would forget all about the child's games and fool's play of long robes, great tonsures, broad cinctures, bishop's and cardinal's hats, crosiers, and similar clowning around." In other words, if we'd already had the things of importance figured out, then maybe we'd have time to debate the other details!

In this month where we continue to commemorate the work of the Reformation, perhaps this is our opportunity to similarly iron out our own priorities as a church. Maybe this our chance to continue being reformed – to let go of the binding minutiae and instead embody the greater law of love to which we are called! There's plenty and more opportunities to be a part of love's reforming process in the month ahead. Whether its distributing diapers, meeting our community with a safe and fun Trunk or Treat, praying God's blessing over our beloved animal companions, offering food as part of Harvest Home Sunday, meeting our seniors with meals and food boxes, or (read on to see even more!), there are so many ways to participate in God's loving action this month at UIC! In this course may you find yourself drawn more closely by the God who binds us in love the God found in the neighbors who we meet in the course of this greatest commandment.

I hope you will come, see, and be re-formed!





# Rich Huff, Operation Santa Claus Fundraiser Basket Raffles/Silent Auction

Rich Huff, a Lewisburg High School graduate, and a member of United in Christ portrayed Santa Claus each year at the Lycoming Mall. After dying from complications from a house fire in Watsontown several years ago, people from our church wanted to honor him by keeping his spirit alive through this fund. This fund has helped children from the Warrior Run, Milton, Lewisburg, and Mifflinburg communities. We help when there is an immediate need that might be overlooked.

We have since expanded our outreach! We now provide a diaper pantry to those towns and their surrounding communities. Baby Steps Diaper Pantry opened in October of 2016 and each month we hand out approximately 1,000 diapers to needy families. The pantry is open the second Saturday of each month. We have since given out over 96,000 diapers.

We continue to purchase needed items for children in our area and each year we give 2-3 high school senior graduation awards. Here's how you can help with this important outreach: In the Fellowship Hall, we will be setting up a **Christmas tree** filled with paper tags. On the back of each Santa is the theme of a basket and examples of items that could go with the theme. Please take one or more tree tags and m bake up a basket with items that match the theme, or you can just bring in some items and we will whip up a basket for you. Baskets will need to be turned in 2 weeks prior to the event (October 20th). Sign your name on the paper that lists the names of the baskets.

Donations of any new items for the fund can be given. Also, if you have any unused local gift cards that you no longer want, we can use those, too.
