FROM THE PASTOR



As we work together with him, we urge you also not to accept the grace of God in vain. For he says, "At an acceptable time I have listened to you, and on a day of salvation I have helped you." See, now is the acceptable time; see, now is the day of salvation! We are putting no obstacle in anyone's way, so that no fault may be found with our ministry, but as servants of God we have commended ourselves in every way: through great endurance, in afflictions, hardships, calamities, beatings, imprisonments, riots, labors, sleepless nights, hunger; by purity, knowledge, patience, kindness, holiness of spirit, genuine love, truthful speech, and the power of God; with the weapons of righteousness for the right hand and for the left; in honor and dishonor, in ill repute and good repute. We are treated as impostors, and yet are true; as unknown, and yet are well known; as dying, and see—we are alive; as punished, and yet not killed; as sorrowful, yet always rejoicing; as poor, yet making many rich; as having nothing, and yet possessing everything.

2 Corinthians 6:1-10

Dear United In Christ,

I have such a love/hate relationship with the 6:05am alarm that is permanently set on my phone. It's set there as a daily reminder that it's time to get rolling, that the day is waiting and I need to get going. However, it's set *just* early enough I've got a bit of buffer to my timing. The day can wait a little while longer after the 6:05 alarm – nothing is going to be missed if I don't get going. I don't *really* have to get out of bed as soon as it goes off – that's what the 6:15 alarm is for! The 6:15 is the last call. It's the siren that actually moves me; it's the sounding bell of urgency that shakes me from complacency and actually puts my feet to the floor!

As we move this month towards Ash Wednesday (lovingly once again on Valentine's Day) and the season of Lent ahead, we may quickly find that it is 6:15am and the alarm is going off. There is urgency in our walk through the wilderness that is before us! While we often think about this time of self-reflection as the opportunity to pause and consider the ways in which we can prepare ourselves for a course of discipleship, the reminder we receive is that the time is clearly now at hand! It's what Paul lays out to the community in Corinth: that while Scripture attests to an acceptable time and a day of salvation, his conviction is that now is the acceptable time, now is the day of salvation! It's 6:15 and the alarm is sounding!

So I suppose now is the time for our feet to hit the ground! Now is the time to set ourselves to the course of God's mission with the neighbors in our midst. As we move into Lent, this season is our opportunity (as Paul reminds us) to take a critical look at what obstacles we may or not be putting in the way of those around us. Have we put stipulations or clauses of exception on the participation of others within our communities? Have we discredited someone with the obstacles of who they are or how they live or where they are from? As we ask regularly that God "forgive us our sins," have we put up oversized hurdles on the track before we are willing to "forgive those who sin against us?" Here in the wilderness, our call might just be to look critically at the road ahead and ask if we have placed any of our own barriers on the path Jesus has already paved – the path that Jesus has made clear for you!

Because there's urgency in the wilderness, after all, and the alarm is going off. The journey is not complete until all know they have a way through this wilderness carved out by the Christ who goes before us. Now is the time to commend ourselves to the course ahead, clearing any further obstacles along the way.

It's 6:15, UIC. Let's get going.

LENTEN OPPORTUNITIES

Parables of Jesus Study Series


Join us at United In Christ for our upcoming Bible Study on Tuesday evenings beginning on February 20th at 6:30pm through the season of Lent! This year we will be journeying through the parables of Jesus alongside Dr. Amy Jill-Levine, the Rabbi Stanley M. Kessler Distinguished Professor of New Testament and Jewish Studies at Hartford International University for Religion and Peace using her series: Short Stories by Jesus: The Enigmatic Parables of a Controversial Rabbi. In the wake of an increase of anti-Semitism and islamophobia, the effects of which even felt here in the Susquehanna Valley, the interfaith voice that Dr. Jill-Levine brings to these stories from Jesus will be of tremendous value as we journey through the wilderness.

Each week will focus on a new parable with a short video and accompanying discussion guide. Copies of the participant guide are available through the church office for \$10/copy. Even without a copy of the guide, you are invited to join us at any point along the way for the study! Come and see!

From the publisher:

Jesus was a skilled storyteller and perceptive teacher who used parables from everyday life to effectively convey his message and meaning. Life in first-century Palestine was very different from our world today, and many traditional interpretations of Jesus' stories ignore this disparity and have often allowed anti-Semitism and misogyny to color their perspectives.

In Short Stories by Jesus, Amy-Jill Levine analyzes these "problems with parables" taking readers back in time to understand how their original Jewish audience understood them. With this revitalized understanding, she interprets these moving stories for the contemporary reader, showing how the parables are not just about Jesus, but are also about us—and when read rightly, still challenge and provoke us two thousand years later.

Now, as of the start of the new year, you all have cleared hat goal!

In just fourteen months, you have *officially* raised \$70,000 towards our series of capital projects on our building! This has been an unprecedented campaign for our community and I am so grateful to all who helped bring us to this point!


