Pastor's Report

Deepened Relationships

One of the coolest dynamics of the past year has been the ways we have been able to deepen our relationships with both our partners in ministry and the neighbors of our community! We deepened our sense of shared identity with other Lutherans in our neighborhood through

shared outings to Knoebels, the Crosscutters, and even gathering for a Trivia Night at Milton Lutheran Church! It has been a joy continuing to engage in those partnerships. What's more, is that as those partnerships deepen, our own ministries have felt that increased connection. We also continued to deepen our relationships with the neighbors in our community. We continued to serve our neighbors through the distribution of the ElderShare food boxes, through

our participation in Milton Panther Pack Program, and through our support of the residents at Danville State Hospital and the veterans at Orangeville Manor. Those open doors even allowed for UIC folks to venture out to Orangeville Manor and host a day of bingo and a free meal for folks there! Just as excitingly, we saw our witness and relationship with the community grow as we

This past year, in addition to the regulars from UIC and CELC, we've been welcoming neighbors from Messiah Lutheran in New Berlin while they are in pastoral interim. It has been a true joy getting to know these Lutherans on the other end of the county, but it was even more exciting to have them join us in worship this past summer for Christmas in July!

Doubly so to be able to celebrate her call to CELC and our ability to stay in partnership with her here at UIC!

Stepped into the New

This past year also saw our community throw support behind a new joint initiative of faith formation in the launch of our "Faith Lab" program. Together with MLC and CELC, we have built upon the model of our day camp to offer a once-a-month opportunity to engage in scripture and fun for our students from pre-k through sixth grade! It is such a blast getting to see the kids engage in the stories of our faith with fun activities and crafts to help reinforce the themes each month. It has also been a tremendous value getting to gather with the parents and adults who attend faith lab for a time of Bible study on the same stories the kids hear each month. Bringing

it together with a meal at the end of the night is always a delight as we get to hear from the kids what they learned through their time together!

On the Pastoral Side

On a last note, I think it's important for you to know how our work together continues to be at work with the larger church. For me, that has continued come on two primary fronts in the past year. First, this past year I was re-elected to a second year of serving on Synod Council. This work with the Office of the Bishop continues to remind me of our shared endeavor with so many of the neighbors in our Synod. More importantly, though, your support allows me to also have an active role in shaping the course of the synod for the years to come, in order that we may as well-equipped as possible for the road ahead.

Second, I continue to serve on the Policy Council of Lutheran Advocacy Ministry in

Pennsylvania (LAMPa). LAMPa serves as the expression of the Church called to bear faithful witness to our convictions and the care of our neighbor at the state level of government. Each year, LAMPa sets a policy agenda that shapes the voice of such advocacy and places that voice at the tables where decisions affecting Pennsylvanians across the state are made. Importantly, LAMPa's work in continuing to advocate for budget prioritization for feeding programs, including funds for the Central Pennsylvania Food Bank, is what allows programs like our ElderShare Food Boxes to continue functioning in our communities. I'm grateful for the opportunity to be a part of this

Maintenance Items Completed in 2024:

- 1. Snow Removal Continued with Mike Culp Trucking to remove snow and salt parking lot
- 2. Women's Restroom Replaced Exhaust fan
- 3. Storage Shed Troop 600 replaced the rotted shingle roof with steel.
- 4. Septic Tank Dennis Wolf pumped septic pump to comply with Kelly TWP ordinance

Projects Completed in 2024:

- 1. Sunday School Roof GSH replaced the remaining membrane roof over SS building at \$43,800 as quoted. This roof was over 40 years old.

OAKS Senior Center became a budgeted program starting in 2024. Previously OAKS was a restricted fund and all income and expenses had to be kept separate. OAKS is a FREE senior center but some of our attendees want to give a donation. We do not ask for donations as we do not want anyone to feel like we expect them!

In 2024 we had 25 people attend OAKS Senior Center for the very first time!

Of the 522 people that attended OAKS (not counting staff or volunteers) only 65 are congregation members. The other 457 are people from the community!

OAKS Senior Center celebrated its 11th anniversary in September 2024.

OAKS Senior Center served a total of 634 meals in 2024. This number does include meals for staff and volunteers, and also 32 meals which were taken for a loved one that couldn't attend or a neighbor.

Lewisburg Senior Center continues to attend OAKS. Lewisburg Senior Center is budgeted to travel to one location per month and they choose OAKS Senior Center. Lewisburg Senior Center pays for Rabbit to pickup their seniors, bring them to OAKS, then pick them up and take them home. It only cost the person \$0.50 and the Lewisburg Senior Center pays the remainder of Rabbit fees.

Donations: UIC Outreach Committee donated leftover items from Christmas blessing bags which were used as bingo prizes. Bucknell Center for Community Engaged Leadership, Learning and Research donated vegetables from their garden. The Central Pennsylvania Food Bank donated ciabatta bread

Senior Express Ministry

Greetings everyone!

For those who don't know, the Senior Express Ministry is our food box delivery ministry to (mostly) homebound low-income seniors. We receive filled boxes from the PA Food Bank once a month and deliver them directly to the seniors at their homes. The boxes are federally or state-funded, depending on the person's income, so UIC has no expense. We also occasionally include cards and small gifts throughout the year to remind seniors that they are loved! We have had a stable year, delivering to between 25 and 30 recipients each month. I try to keep the routes short- between 3 and 5 people. Several volunteers have also gone to the PA Food Bank in Williamsport twice during the year to help fill boxes for recipients, which is always a fun and fulfilling experience.

I would like to thank all who make this ministry possible: our delivery drivers, Diane Gottlieb and her grandson, Garrett; Ted and Shirley McPherrin; Jeff and Julie Rowe and their family; Michelle Shearer; Warren Shipe; and Bob and Trudy Swartz; our callers: Kathy Guffey and Rosemary Kline and Terri Cromwell who keeps our records. We couldn't do this without all of you!

A special thank you goes out to Bob Swartz, who meets the Food Bank truck each month and brings all the boxes into the church.

I'd also like to thank the Outreach Committee, which prepared Christmas bags for each recipient. They were very grateful.

This ministry began during the COVID shutdown, and I am so grateful to all of you who help to continue to make it happen.

Giving was low so we had to moved \$10,000 from Restricted Memorial Fund to Unrestricted Fund to cover budgeted expenses. The finance Committee also decided discontinue 5 funds that had restricted money, meaning the money could only be used for that specific thing. OAKS and Technology are both now a budgeted item instead of restricted funds. This helped increase the Unrestricted Fund which is used to pay for budgeted church expenses.

United In Christ Lutheran Church 2024 Outreach Committee Annual Report

The Outreach Committee is a small but mighty group of passionate disciples who care about giving to others. In 2024, we tried to stretch funds whenever possible using the Thrivent Action Team Grants from congregation members in the amount of \$250 each.

MONTHLY FOOD COLLECTION



Non-perishable food items were collected in a basket in the Narthex on an ongoing basis. Your donations were delivered to Our Little Free Pantry in West Milton twice a month. This ministry had a lot of drama and flux during the year. However, a brand-new building was donated and placed on the grounds in December by T Ross Construction.

In 2024 you donated ______food items.

The Outreach Committee plans to discontinue this ministry in 2025. Feel free to stop by the new building next to the gas station in West Milton to donate your items anytime.

SOUPER BOWL OF CARING

On Sunday, February 11, 2024, we participated in the Souper Bowl of Caring to benefit Milton Panther Packs which provides over 250 students at Baugher and White Deer Elementary Schools with a bag of food over every weekend during the school year. Lisa Rabuck used a Thrivent Action Team Grant to stretch the number of food items to be given. A total of 859 food items and \$85 were donated to Milton Panther Packs. Items were dropped off at the St. Andrew's United Methodist Church in Milton where the packs are constructed to be used for the March Panther Packs.



VALENTINES PACKAGE FOR COLLEGE STUDENTS

You supported our college students once again with the Valentines Care Packages. To save on shipping costs, pre-constructed snack boxes were ordered from Amazon and delivered directly to Owen A., Mya C., Emma D., Larissa S., and Sarah S. In addition, the money collected by congregational members was used to purchase gift cards for each student. Terri sent the signed Valentine's Day cards and gift cards in a manila envelope to each college student.

CENTRAL PA FOOD BANK BOX PACKING



Congregational members participated in two food box packing events at the Central PA Food Bank in Williamsport. On Monday, March 4 from 1 – 3 PM, congregational members packed Veterans Share boxes for local military veterans and their families. Lenten offering in the amount of \$545 was given to the Central PA Food Bank. Then on Wednesday, June 5, from 5 – 7 PM congregational members met at the warehouse on 3301 Wahoo Drive in Williamsport to help pack Senior Express Food boxes.

MILTON PANTHER PACKS

Congregational members participated in **three** packing events at St. Andrew's United Methodist Church in Milton for the Milton Panther Pack program in 2024. On Wednesday, January 3 from 6 – 7 PM, congregational members packed the Panther Packs for the month of January for the over 250 students to have food over the four weekends in February. Then on Wednesday, March 6 from 6 – 7 PM, congregational members packed the Panther Packs for the month of March seeing donated

COMMUNITY EASTER EGG HUNT

The congregation donated candy and small trinkets to fill the plastic eggs the UICLC has recycled over the years and purchased new. On Friday, March 29, congregation members filled the plastic eggs with the donated items in preparation for the egg hunt. With the help of a Thrivent Action Team Grant from Sherry Bingaman, prizes were purchased for each of the three age groups. Then on Saturday, March 30, members helped put out over 600 filled eggs and 30 prize eggs for over forty kids aged 1–12 years old.

SUN PRIDE EVENT

On Saturday, June 1, 2024, UICLC had a space at the SUN Pride Event at Hufnagle Park in Lewisburg from 10 AM – 5 PM. Al, Ruby, Donna, and Sherry represented the church, handing out free bottles of cold water and individual snack packages. Ruby is going to apply for a Thrivent Action Team Grant. The UICLC tri-fold flyer and photo cards of events as well as stickers, coloring sheets, and keychains were available for anyone to take. Ruby Baker used a Thrivent Action Team Grant to pay for water, snacks, and supplies.

DANVILLE STATE HOSPITAL

During the months of June and July, congregational members donated personal care items to be given to the residents at Danville State Hospital. In addition, donated clothing was sorted and given. With the help of a Thrivent Action Team Grant from Ruby and Ken Baker, other items were purchased to stretch the number of wish list items given in early August. Also, Ruby organized a donation of holiday gifts for fifteen residents based on their gift requests for Christmas. Congregation members adopted Danville State residents and purchased gifts on their wish lists. Unwrapped gifts were returned to the church. Ruby collected the gifts for the residents at Danville State Hospital and Donna C delivered them to Danville State Hospital before Christmas.

SUMMER LUNCH PROGRAM

On Friday, July 19, 2024, Ruby, Kathy A, and Gwen helped with the Summer Lunch Program at the Pentecostal Church on Route 192 outside of Lewisburg. They packed and distributed approximately 45 grocery bags of food. Participants received food for two weeks determined by the number of school age children in their family. UIC has participated in the Lewisburg Summer Lunch Program for the last 10+ years. The Rich Huff Fund paid for the fresh fruit and vegetable donations which were given to the families receiving the bags of food.



BLESSING BACKPACKS AND DONATING SCHOOL SUPPLIES

Blessing of Backpacks Sunday was celebrated on Sunday, August 18, 2024. Congregation members donated backpacks and school supplies. The Rich Huff Funda donated backpacks. With the help of a Thrivent Action Team Grant from Ken Criswell, canned soup and macaroni and cheese cups were purchased to increase the number of items donated. We partnered with Milton Lutheran Parish to collect a total of 493 packs of crayons, pencils, notebooks, markers, colored pencils, backpacks and more. We were able to attend Milton High School's Open House and White Deer Elementary School's Back-to-School Night to hand out some of the items. The remaining items suitable for K-2 students were given to the school counselor at Baugher Elementary School to hand out as needed.



HAM AND BEAN SOUP SALE

The tradition continued in 2024 with the Annual Ham and Bean Soup Sale. Three kettles of soup were made on Thursday, September 12 and Friday, September 13. Advanced sales were collected with pick-up on both days. Then on Saturday, September 14, UICLC sold bowls and quarts of Ham and Bean Soup on Broadway Street during the Milton Harvest Festival. With the help of a Thrivent Action Team Grant from Mark Rabuck and other donations by members, most of the expenses were paid in advance. A total of \$1,734 was given to God's Chuckwagon, a local mobile soup kitchen in Northumberland County. Given the heavy lifting and time to coordinate these efforts, the Outreach Committee plans to change this event in 2025.



HARVEST HOME SUNDAY



Harvest Home Sunday was celebrated on Sunday, November 10, 2024. Congregation members donated items for the Milton Panther Packs. With the help of a Thrivent Action Team Grant from Ken Criswell, canned soup and macaroni and cheese cups were purchased to increase the number of items donated. The

OUR ORANGEVILLE MANOR COLLECTION AND VISIT
