

The wild animals will honor me, the jackals and the ostriches; for I give water in the wilderness, rivers in the desert, to give drink to my chosen people, the people whom I formed for myself so that they might declare my praise.

Dear United In Christ,

As I write this, the trees on our street have been blooming for about a week now. I didn't notice it last year after we moved into our new house, but this year I've really taken count of the wide array of color that splashes across our street from the various flowering trees in our neighbors' yards. The bright whites, the yellow-greens, and the various shades of pink have been a truly delightful sight of new life that has welcomed us every time we have returned home this Spring! Admittedly, I don't know a single one of these from any other, I just know that they all cause me to sneeze just the same! Regardless, their spontaneously display of splendor has been captivating! These springtime sights seem to preaching the reality of God's new life moving into the world in this Easter season. "I am about to do a new thing," God says through the prophet Isaiah, "now it springs forth, do you not perceive it?" It's hard to miss the dazzling arboreal displays, after all! We take delight in these signs of God's continued care of creation blooming forth around us! We cherish these sights as showing to us God's continued presence and beauty springing forth into this world!

But I fear that we oftentimes find ourselves *only* looking for God's spontaneous sights. We ask God to show us a sign of God's care that defies our explanation. We pray for God's intervention of life in a world that seems set on its destructive and death-dealing ways. We long for God to do a new thing and then we sit back with our binoculars simply trying to see it happen. But maybe not every new thing – maybe not every movement of new life – is so *spontaneous*.

As I write this, I am right now sitting on the back porch watching our neighbor across the yard delicately spraying something around his flower beds. He's got about four of these landscaping displays across the yard and they are kept in gorgeous shape. He keeps them meticulously maintained, making sure they are on a proper watering schedule, making sure they are pruned to an appropriate degree, and apparently defending their well-being with whatever it is he has in that spray can he's using right now.

See, I sometimes wonder if we spend so much time looking for God to simply manifest new life in our midst that we lose track of the ways in which God might be calling *us* to help spring it forth. Perhaps God is using *us* to do the new thing that God envisions, if only we can perceive it! It might just be that God is calling us to bear new life for the sake of this straining world by stepping where God parts the chaos for the clarion call of dry ground; by offering drink in the parched places of the earth; by breaking down the bars of oppression and captivity; by forgetting the former things and embracing the new thing to which God is calling us.

Perhaps this new life that God issues doesn't only spring forth in spontaneity like the trees giving me spring fever, but also needs diligent, humble, and careful cultivation like my neighbor's land-scaping. Perhaps we are being called to tend to God's new thing of life in and for this world. Perhaps the way that God is making is one to which we are being drawn into service in order to establish and maintain with the fullness of our attention. Maybe *we* become stewards of the new thing that God is doing in this world!

This month we have an awesome opportunity to be a part of that process in real time. On May 13th, we will be gathering with Lutherans from across the state for the annual Lutheran Day in the Capitol sponsored by Lutheran Advocacy Ministry in Pennsylvania (LAMPa). The theme verse for this year's gathering is Isaiah 43:19 ("Behold, I am doing a new thing!"). It seems vastly appropriate as the diligent and careful work we will set ourselves to that day will be in advocating for the continued care of our neighbors and God's creation. In a world where it becomes routine to lose sight of those whose needs go silently unnoticed and where our demands for more regularly leave entire landscapes to waste, it is good to be called into God's new thing.

As stewards of our corners of God's kingdom, it seems fitting that we should set ourselves to such diligent caretaking by advocating for such needs with our local representatives. If you have not been able to attend a Lutheran Day in the Capitol in the past, I hope you will take this year's opportunity to join us! Since I have had the privilege to serve on LAMPa's Policy Council for the past two years I have been inspired by the continued cultivation of care that this ministry has set itself towards and trust that you may be too! Read on for more details on how to join! In the meantime, may this month and this season continue to draw us into the new things God is doing. May we be inspired by the new life seeming to burst forth around us in this Easter season. May we also commit ourselves to the careful diligence of cultivating such new life in the places of our own care. In so doing, may we see a fuller glimpse of God's continued care for this world in and through you!


